#### **Sunday, 15 May 2016**

#### FRIENDS' SUMMER VISIT

#### **BOWES MUSEUM & MARKENFIELD HALL**

The Friends of Bolton Priory made their summer visit this year on 10 June, the joint destination being Bowes Museum near Barnard Castle followed by Markenfield Hall, near Ripon.

For once the weather forecast did not matter and our luxury coach with thirty one Friends and their friends aboard, sped through mist and rain to arrive at (and squeeze miraculously through) the superb wrought iron gateway to get our first view of Bowes Museum. The huge French Chateau, unique for this part of the world, always conveys an amazing wow factor whether or not it is your first visit.

After coffee, two volunteer guides divided the party for a detailed tour of the displays, bringing us up to date with the history of the place at the same time.

John, natural son of the 10<sup>th</sup> Earl of Strathmore (the Bowes Lyon family) was born in 1811, and his father within hours of his death married John's mother to legitimise his status and ensure his inheritance. This did not earn John the Earldom, but he acquired the huge land holdings of the North East, making him hugely wealthy.

His interest in all the arts took him to France where he met and married Josephine, a somewhat middling actress but a talented painter, also sharing John's interest in the whole spectrum of art. They conceived the plan to found a museum on John's beloved North East, and between 1862 and 1874 over 15,000 objets d'art were purchased.

The museum finally opened in 1892 too late for either John or Josephine to see it, but the Trustees made sure their wishes were carried out to the

letter. An hour and a half was barely enough to give us more than a lightning tour but after a brief lunch there was time to revisit personal highlights. Anna and I (and several others) fell in love with the "English Rose" exhibition celebrating feminine beauty from Van Dyck to Sargeant.

Finally we all convened on the top floor to watch the daily performance of the Silver Swan, an astonishing clockwork automaton constructed in 1773, and acquired by John after the Paris Exhibition of 1867

Then it was back to the coach and down to Markington Hall which presented a total contrast. This is a delightful Medieval manor house, the current building dating from 1310 but with parts including the undercroft going back to 1230. The De Markenfield family prospered, partly by ensuring they always supported the "right" side for over two centuries until in 1536 as prominent Catholics they supported the Pilgrimage of Grace. By also joining the Rising of the North in 1569 the whole estate was forfeited to the Crown and was acquired by Thomas Egerton who used it purely as an investment. This continued even after Sir Richard Norton, took over in 1761. He became the 1st Lord Grantley but the house had to wait until the 7<sup>th</sup> Lord before serious restoration commenced and the owner at last became its occupier.

The result of this total lack of additions and "improvements" for four centuries but just enough care to keep it wind and watertight has provided a unique chance to visit a totally unspoilt Medieval home. Our guides treated us to an incredibly detailed two hour historical tour of this gem, from the moat and gatehouse, through the undercoft into the Great Hall and the Chapel.

One of the many joys of editing the Friends' Newsletter is receiving correspondence from members who don't live locally but continue to support Bolton Priory through their prayers and membership subscriptions. It's a pleasure being allowed to share their recollections of visiting the Priory – whether this was a single visit or has become a regular outing over the years.

Steve Mansfield contacted recently and has agreed to me including a brief excerpt from our email exchanges in our Newsletter. Steve lives in Fotherby, Lincolnshire and attends St Giles Church in Grimsby. A retired teacher, he continues to be actively involved in his local community, the church and school.

"I do love to visit the Priory and in fact the whole area as often as I possibly can. It seems a long time ago now since my first visit when myself and four of my friends stayed in a caravan in the farmyard at Bolton Bridge and spent a glorious week walking everywhere. We went up Beamsley Beacon, drank fresh milk from a farm gate in Storiths, walked during an evening into Addingham for a bag of chips, daily walks into Skipton and Ilkley and I still see the other three lads even today. Some of my visits have coincided with special events such as one day when we called, Freddie Truman's daughter was getting married...or was it his son? Never mind".

#### FRIENDS' LATE SUMMER VISIT

#### **BURTON CONSTABLE HALL, NEAR HULL**

On Thursday September 8<sup>th</sup> a coach load of thirty two Friends (and friends) set off for a visit to Burton Constable, near Hull, with a quick look at Beverley Minster on the way home.

Once we had escaped from the West Riding, the sun shone for the rest of the day. Burton Constable, now run by a Foundation Trust, is a huge originally Elizabethan house, although the family has had a house there since the 12<sup>th</sup> century. The current building has been added to over the centuries both inside and out and also boasts a superb 18<sup>th</sup> century Palladian stable block.

We were able to take our time around the interior which was just as well as there was so much to see, and some joined a brief lecture outside on "Capability" Brown who was responsible for designing the Park.

The Constable family remained Catholics after the Reformation and we saw the usual results of the family fortunes rising and falling throughout the centuries. This family managed in the main to keep their faith (more or less) but adopting a low profile, the results we saw were superb and very much in good heart.

The free-and-easy style of the day extended to Beverley Minster (without a hint of Capt. Mainwaring from our organiser) and we were able to wander around a virtually empty building as we pleased.

It is a huge church, bigger than a third of our cathedrals at 393 feet long, and has had the usual chequered career since its foundation in the 8<sup>th</sup> century. The superb nave and twin transepts, a beautifully carved and decorated wood choir, and some fabulous stained glass, all within total peace and tranquillity made it obvious why it was chosen to film interior scenes of "Westminster Abbey" for the current Victoria T.V. series.

We could have spent so much time there but sped off in order to return to Bolton Abbey by 6.45pm.
